Professional

2008

- Competed in five events on the Duramed FUTURES Tour, where her best finish was a tie for eighth at the American Systems Invitational.
- Returned to the LPGA Final Qualifying Tournament, where she finished tied for 15th to earn Priority List Category 11 for the 2009 LPGA season.

Career

- In 2007, recorded a career-best tie for 18th at the LPGA State Farm Classic, where she carded a career-low 66 in the final round; returned to the LPGA Final Qualifying Tournament, where she finished tied for 39th to retain non-exempt status for the 2008 LPGA season.
- In 2006, played in 18 events on the Duramed FUTURES Tour, with a season-best tie for fifth at the Greater Tampa Duramed FUTURES Classic; tied for 16th at the LPGA Final Qualifying Tournament to earn non-exempt status for the 2007 LPGA season.
- In 2005, played in 16 events on the Futures Tour, with one top-five finish.
- In 2004, played in 16 events on the Futures Tour, where she recorded two top-10 finishes, including a runner-up finish at the GMAC Futures Golf Classic.
- In 2003, turned professional in August.

Amateur

Cho-Hunicke won the 1998 Japan Junior Masters and was a quarterfinalist in the U.S. Girls' Junior Championship in 1998. An American Junior Golf Association (AJGA) All-American, Cho-Hunicke was a member of the French Junior National Team in 1999. She competed in three U.S. Women's Amateur Championships (2000-02) and advanced to the round of 16 in the U.S. Women's Public Links in 2002 and 2003. She qualified for the U.S. Women's Open as an amateur twice: in 1999 as the youngest player in the field at the age of 17, and also in 2002. Cho-Hunicke won two collegiate events and was a two-time All-Southeastern Conference (SEC) Second-Team selection (2000, 2002) at the University of Florida. Cho-Hunicke also excelled in the classroom as she earned Third-Team Verizon Academic All-American honors in 2003, was a three-time Verizon Academic

All-District III Team member, a three-time member of the National Golf Coaches Association (NGCA) All-American Scholar Golf Team and a three-time member of the SEC Academic Honor Roll.
