- Recorded a career-best tie for 39th at the Michelob ULTRA Open at Kingsmill.
- Carded a career-low 67 in the second round of the LPGA Corning Classic.
- Won the Kentucky Women's Open by five strokes in July.

Career

- In 2008, competed in 14 events on the Duramed FUTURES Tour, winning the inaugural AMERICAN SYSTEMS Invitational and finishing eighth on the season-ending money list; returned to the LPGA Final Qualifying Tournament, where she tied for 21st and claimed the final spot in Priority List Category 11 for the 2009 LPGA season via a four-hole, sudden-death playoff.
- In 2007, turned professional in June and competed in 10 events on the Duramed FUTURES Tour with one top-10 finish; tied for 25th at the LPGA Final Qualifying Tournament to earn non-exempt status for the 2008 LPGA season.

Amateur

Wigger won the 2002 Kentucky State Amateur Championship, the 2003 Joanne Winter Arizona Silver Belle Championship, the 2005 Women's Eastern Championship and was the 2005 NCAA individual runner-up finisher. She won the 2007 Women's Harder Hall Invitational. Wigger recorded 24 top-10 finishes, including a win at the 2007 Georgia Bulldog Invitational, while at the University of Virginia. Wigger was a Second-Team National Golf Coaches Association (NGCA) All-American selection in 2006 and 2007, and received honorable mention honors in 2005. She was also a four-time NGCA Academic All-American selection and All-Atlantic Coast Conference (2004-06). Wigger earned the 2007 IMP Award for the Outstanding Female Athlete of the Year at the University of Virginia. She qualified for the U.S. Women's Open in 2007.
