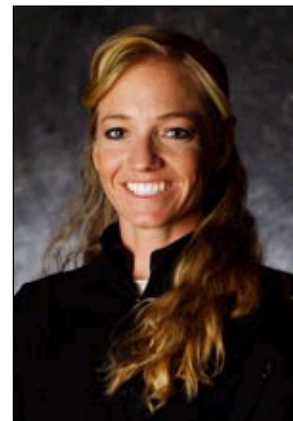

Professional

2010

- Finished tied for 16th at the Bell Micro LPGA Classic; tied for 50th at the RICOH Women's British Open and tied for 63rd at the Safeway Classic Presented by Coca-Cola.

Career

- In 2009, best finish was a tie for 19th at Navistar LPGA Classic Presented by Monaco RV; recorded her first LPGA career hole-in-one during the first round of the J Golf Phoenix LPGA International. Presented by Mirassou Winery.
- In 2008, best finish was a tie for 13th at the Corona Championship.
- In 2007, best finish was a tie for 22nd at the Safeway Classic Presented by Pepsi.
- In 2006, recorded a career-best tie for 16th at the LPGA Corning Classic, where she carded a career-low 66 during the first round.
- In 2005, best finish was a tie for 18th at the LPGA Corning Classic; competed in eight events on the Futures Tour, where her best finish was a tie for second at the M&T Bank Loretto FUTURES Golf Classic.
- In 2004, played on the Futures Tour, where she recorded five top-10 finishes, including runner-up finishes at the Laconia Savings Bank FUTURES Golf Classic and the York Newspaper Company FUTURES Classic, where she lost in a sudden-death playoff to Malinda Johnson; tied for 32nd at the LPGA Final Qualifying Tournament to earn non-exempt status for the 2005 LPGA season.
- In 2003, turned professional in October.

Amateur

Tamulis advanced to the semifinals of the 2003 North-South Amateur Championship. While at Florida State University (FSU), where she won two tournaments, she was named a National Golf Coaches Association (NGCA) Academic All-American in 2001 and was a 2003 NCAA All-American Honorable Mention. Tamulis earned All-Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) honors from 2001-03 to become the first FSU golfer and only the 12th player in ACC history to be named All-ACC three or more times. Her 65 in the

final round of the 2003 ACC Championship set a school record.
