Career Highlights

- Enters 2013 ranked sixth on the LPGA Career Money List
- Became the youngest member to be inducted into the LPGA Tour and World Golf Halls of Fame at the age of 29
- Captured the 2007 Jamie Farr Owens Corning Classic Presented by Kroger, becoming the third player in LPGA Tour to win the same event five times
- In 2005, was limited to 12 events because of neck, shoulder, lower back and finger injuries
- Became the first Asian player to win the Vare Trophy in 2003 for lowest scoring average
- Her victory at the 1998 McDonald's LPGA Championship was her first major – and she became the first rookie since Liselotte Neumann to win a major as her first Tour victory
- Won the 1998 U.S. Women's Open after a 20-hole playoff and joined Juli Inkster as the only two LPGA players to capture two modern major championships as a rookie
- Won Rolex Player of the Year honors in 1998, nine weeks before the end of the season
- In 1997, qualified for the Tour by winning the LPGA Final Qualifying Tournament
- Won 30 tournaments in Korea as an amateur

Get to know Se Ri...

- The only South Korean on the LPGA Tour during her rookie year in 1998, Se Ri's dramatic win at the 1998 U.S. Women's Open inspired a surge in Korean women's golf. She is considered a pioneer of the game, inspiring a generation of South Korean golfers including current LPGA players Na Yeon Choi and Inbee Park who have been nicknamed "Se Ri kids."
- If she weren't a golfer, Se Ri would likely run her own business
